PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

1. BCF

1.1 International Events

Some important events have taken place in the UK in the past 12 months with the organisation and support of the BCF including the semi finals of the World Championship, the Phillips and Drew/GLC Kings International event at County Hall, one of the strongest ever, and the Oakham Junior event. More recently the USSR v Rest of the World match took place in Docklands ; this was set up in 7 days from agreement being reached to go ahead in London. The next Olympiad will be held in Greece in November 1984.

1.2 Long Term Planning

In March the BCF management board held a one day meeting on long term planning to develop plans and identify resources required to expand activities in the years ahead. A summary was reported in the June edition of 'Newsflash'.

A number of working parties have been set up to study areas of activity and make recommendations on matters including

- broadening the basis of grading
- increasing membership
- improving administration and developing a more effective organisation
- adult training
- setting up a National Chess Centre and library
- improving communications
- national competitions
- reducing adjudications

It is encouraging that the BCF is making a determined effort to develop strategic plans which in time should benefit all chess players

1.3 Others Matters

- a The BBC have agreed to go forward with a plan for a primary schools tournament on Ceefax
- b The National grading system is under development and it is hoped to introduce this in about a year's time.
- c At the BCF Council Meeting in July IGM Ray Keene was elected as the new Publicity Director. He was largely instrumental in obtaining sponsorship for the World Championship semi finals and for the USSR v Rest of the World match.

2. SCCU

- 2.1 At the 1984 Council Meeting in June your President was re-elected President of the SCCU for a third term. Chris Lean was re-elected a member of the Executive Committee as was Oliver Stobart after an absence of some years.

Your President remains a member of the BCF Management Board.

- 2.2 Also in June the SCCU held its own first meeting on Long Term Planning. Matters to be investigated include
 - seeking dialogue with other chess organisations in the southern area towards closer collaboration
 - training and development
 - possibility of additional, or alternative, competitions.

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR 1984 HERTS CHESS ASSOCIATION AGM

1. BCF FINANCE

The British Chess Magazine increased its profits considerably in the financial year to 31 August 1983. The profit was over £11000 - before tax but after £2400 maintenance on the property. The repairs, which the surveyor specified in his report before the BCM was purchased, have now all been completed.

The BCM has contracted to buy an Apple computer with 4 terminals and large Winchester disc storage at a cost of £19500 . The whole cost of this will be allowable against profits for tax purposes. This computer will also be available to the BCF for grading and general office purposes.

The BCM continued profitable trading in the current year. The BCF accounts were not completed by the Budget meeting, owing to a change in treasurer and the new treasurer not yet familiar with all details. Despite this uncertainty the 1984/5 budget estimated a loss of £3000, after increasing the levy to £85 a point (from £80). This levy was adopted, with votes cast for various levies as follows:-

Subsequently, draft accounts showed a 1983/4 surplus of about £1500.

2. Herts Chess Association Accounts.

This was a more successful year. The loss was reduced from £30 in the previous year to £4, and the adjusted loss (see details) after allowing for previous year effects was £12 against a budgeted loss of £42.

This was mainly due to an increase in BCF fees received, adjudication profits and the congress was again successful. Expenses were mainly very close to estimates, the County matches being above estimate because of our success in the Minor Counties Championship, incurring extra expenses for at least the Quarter and Semi Final stages.

The 1983/84 actual figures differ slightly from the accounts due to previous year adjustments which are omitted here to give a better picture.

- (a) These take account of the following increase in fees, which I consider necessary after two years with losses.

Club £2.00, Senior Members £2.00, Junior Members £1.00,
Vice-Presidents £3.50 minimum. BCF £1.50.

- (b) Assuming we continue to charge the BCF fee + £1. The BCF fees are probably going to remain unaltered at £3 (and £5 for an appeal) and, if so, we will continue to charge £4 (and £6 for an appeal).
- (c) Reduced from this year, since we had the benefit of higher interest rates in the first half of the year.
- (d) Based on BCF and SCCU proposals, which will most probably be adopted at their AGMs.
- (e) This is still an estimate for this year.
- (f) See separate Insurance proposal - there will be no benefit this year, but next year should show a reduction.
- (g) Allowing for a general increase of postage and telephone charges.
- (h) Assuming an entry charge slightly higher than this year.

INSURANCE - COMPARISON OF HERTS & BCF SCHEMES

Last year the Association paid £25 for Liability Insurance for itself and all members clubs.

Club insurance was paid by all except Allenbury's, British Aerospace, Godfrey Davis Europcar, IDEC, Lucas Aerospace and St Mary's (Royston). These clubs were probably covered by their firms' general insurance cover. Other clubs paid a total of £101 and the Association itself paid £51.

The BCF scheme is cheaper in two areas.

1. Liability Insurance is included in each club's equipment insurance Saving £25

 2. Equipment insurance is cheaper for each club which insures over £500. The net saving overall would be mainly for the Association's own equipment. Totalling £30

The Liability Insurance costs (approx) £1 per club, so the clubs who would be out of pocket are Bishops Stortford, Marconi, Old Elizabethans.

PTO

The disadvantages of the BCF scheme are:

1. Premiums are due on 1 October - before most members subscriptions have been paid. However, every club should have sufficient funds to be able to pay in time.
2. Each club is dealing direct with the BCF - who would not remind people if the premium was not paid. I have always contacted non-payers, who have all then paid the premium.
3. Unless we are prepared to pay £25 to cover Liability Insurance (with no refund on 1 October) we would be without cover from 1 August to 30 September.
4. The BCF may ask for up-to-date valuation of valuable cups, which would take up all the first year's savings.

Advantages:

1. A single policy covering both equipment and Liability.
2. A considerable saving - equivalent to over 15p per member each year.
3. Most of the Association's cups have not been valued for Insurance since 1973, and so should be valued fairly soon in any case.

The decision whether to stay with our present arrangement or join the BCF scheme is most important - we only get half the savings if only a few clubs join the BCF scheme and we still need to pay the £25 for Liability Insurance for the rest.

It is MOST IMPORTANT that each club makes its views known. If any insured club cannot send a representative to the AGM, please let me know your views so that the AGM can make a better judgement.

I would advocate that the Association insures its own equipment with the BCF. There would be no saving from this next year - because of valuation cost - but a considerable saving from 1985 onwards.

LUCK IN CHESS

Yes- our game is governed by a lady- the muse Caissa. She was not one of the original daughters of Zeus and Mnemosyne, so she is a very touchy young nymph. She smiles, and you win or she averts her glance and you draw, or she frowns and you lose. Once you have accepted her aegis you can stop worrying about the actual techniques of the game, and relax. To simplify the mysterious workings of Caissa, I have subdivided luck into types.

a) Before the game: Luck unrelated to Chess.

I think it was Mieses who said "I never beat a fit player". All losers have colds, flu, headaches etc. So, you may be lucky before you start your opponent may be unwell, or have something on his mind. As a wise player remarked "You can't play when you're worried".

b) Before the game: Luck related to Chess.

You play an obscure gambit, your opponent refutes it, then remarks that he studied a treatise on it the night before. I can remember an opponent (T.K. Hemingway) who confidently refuted my Benko Gambit and beat me. After the game he remarked "I've met that gambit four times this season. Sometimes, I have gained from this stroke of luck. The choice of colour is important psychologically, as most players are happier with one or the other, and your pairing can be lucky, you may meet a player who regards you as his 'bogey' and loses.

c) During the game: Luck unrelated to Chess.

Unforeseen strokes of luck can determine the result. I was once playing against Oxford in Oxford (Have you tried parking here?) and I was losing soundly. My opponent, a strong positional player had won one pawn and isolated two others. I was contemplating a slow won 'blob' when he suddenly looked at his watch and exclaimed 'My car' and mumbled something like "No waiting area: a draw?". I gasped, accepted the draw, and as he bolted from the room, had a vision of Caissa in traffic warden's uniform.

d) During the game: Luck related to Chess.

Often a seconds blindness costs a game. Many an immortal suffered a debacle like this. Sammy Reshevsky played 40. Oxpch BxQ 41. resigns (In Forsyth from white's QR1) 1b6/5PKP/5B2/6P1/1pqP3p/pn5pk/4bQ2/6R1 he should have played 40. P-N5ch KxP 41. P-R4ch KxP 42. Q-B4 mate

Carol Fewtrell, Hilltop, did well for a share of the Ladies Prize.

The world of Juniors is very different. Touring professionals aged around 9 to 12, organised in car loads from far flung provinces such as Scunthorpe or even Northamptonshire, descend for the chance of winning the coveted London Junior Entry Vouchers. This year the outstanding player was Stephen Cullip of Bozeat. If previous Junior winners are anything to go by this is a name to look for in the future. At the age of 9 he took the KNIGHTS with 6/6 and the U13 BISHOPS with $5\frac{1}{2}/6$. His winnings would pay the petrol with ease. The productivity prize goes to Mark Hann of Raunds with 7/7 in a small but well fought U16 ROOKS. It was an all play all.

Many thanks to the control team for their excellent support, and to the competitors whose forbearance and good humour made the whole event worthwhile.

THE HILLTOP CHESS CLUB.

Formed in February 1959 and meeting initially in the Rent Office at South Hatfield, the club moved into the Hilltop pub when it opened in August of that year. From an attendance which barely managed double figures, the club gradually grew until, by the early Seventies we were running six teams - five in the Herts League plus one in the Barnet & District.

The mid-Seventies saw a much wider interest in chess, largely as a result of the Fisher-Spassky match. The Hilltop by now had some fifty members and was enjoying success in various competitions; twice reaching the quarter finals of the National Club, twice winning Division 1 of the Herts League as well as winning the Barnet League and Barnet League Knock Out.

The club runs two internal competitions, the McCorquadale Cup and the Hodson Trophy, both all play all events. The former was donated by Mrs Hugh McCorquadale (Barbera Cartland) and the latter by Dr. Hodson - who almost drew a league game once. Unfortunately, Harry Palmer who was match captain decided to have a look at it and discovered a win for the opposition. Such is chess. The McCorquadale is currently held by Phil Lucas and the Hodson by Chris Fewtrell.

John Jepps, who many of you will remember, was one of our first members, also the fastest player in the county. Succeeding efficient officers including Jim Gateley, Richard Oxborough, Roy Talbot, Oliver Stobart and Neil Willmott have assured our continued prosperity.

After a lax period at the end of the Seventies due to players leaving the area, the club is again expanding, currently running five teams. 1984 is our Silver Jubilee and we marked the occasion with a one day congress sponsored by McMullen's of Hertford. This was successful (particularly for Mr. Talbot) and is likely to be repeated.

A more recent development than the internal competitions has been a five minute all play all at the Red Lion in Hatfield on Sunday evenings. This event has proved popular with players from all over Hertfordshire and beyond. It also provides a useful extra club evening to arrange teams, discuss tactics, etc.

The club stays open throughout the Summer on Thursday evenings, new members and visitors are always welcome. Meeting on licensed premises encourages a social atmosphere, unique in my experience as well as ensuring a reasonable away record!

FIFTY YEARS OF ELIZABETHAN CHESS

To celebrate half a century of chess in Barnet and Hertfordshire the members of the club have presented a silver salver to K.L.Woodland, founder of the club, Chairman, Coach, Match Captain and top board for many years. He also received a silver cup bearing his name to be open for competition within the club. The presentation was made on behalf of the members by B.S.Bowie, currently the Match Captain.

K.L.Woodland learned his chess at University in the twenties. There was quite a lot of chess in the students common room, and the University ran a team in the Southampton League. By his third year Woodland was a useful player, and by volunteering to be the club secretary got himself a place in the team. From that time onwards for the next sixty years he was always more in demand as an organiser than as a player. He came to London in 1931, joined the Finchley Chess Club and started to teach chess at Queen Elizabeth's School, Barnet. Finchley was a small club and traditionally started each season with a simul against one of the ex-British champions playing in the London League- there were probably half a dozen to choose from, such was the strength of London Chess. R.C.Griffith was the victim this year (RCG is the founder of MCO). He successfully played 10 boards but lost to KLW. That was the first game Woodland recorded and kept, it was before the age of clocks, so keeping a game score served little purpose. It was 4 years before the two men met again, by which time Woodland had become the Finchley Match Captain, the club had won promotion to Div.1 of the London League (20 boards) and he found himself paired with R.C.Griffith (Hampstead) in a very lop-sided match. Woodland won his game but Finchley lost 18-2. We quote the two games:-
